



From Principal Millsap

In 2006, I was job searching and knew that I was looking for something special - a community that placed students at the center of everything, a place that would demand that I adapt and grow as an educator, and a place where relationships formed the foundation for learning. I visited Scott Bell's classroom one morning, back when the school was located on the DSHS Campus. I was not struck that day by a 1:1 laptop ratio, or glitzy project presentations (although both were impressive). I was struck by a conversation that Mr. Bell facilitated between me and his history class. He brought them to the front of the room, gathered closely with some seated on the floor and he asked them to describe their school. They discussed the trust that teachers put in them and the opportunities to be creative. They shared how they felt they belonged and learned about each other's strengths and areas for growth. They talked about how the projects were engaging and that their learning often surprised them. These are the things that brought me to Da Vinci and it's the reason I'm still here. I continue to believe it's an incredibly special place where I hope to send my own child one day.

I would like to thank all of the parents and community members who have contacted me with supportive and constructive feedback about the media coverage this week. Our staff continues the important work of preparing students for success in college and career each day without distraction; your comments are welcomed and appreciated. We as a staff continue to reflect on this situation in order to improve our practice.
